A&T Breakdown: The Aggies are coming off their first losing season since 2011. The Aggies also missed a postseason appearance for the first time since the 2014 season. A&T heads into this season looking to bounce back in its second and final season in the Big South before transitioning to the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA). The Aggies have a mixture of young talent and veteran players.

Coach Washington (Miss. Valley State '82): The 2022 season will mark his fourth season on the sideline and his fifth overall at A&T after the Aggies canceled the 2020 season due to the COVID-19 pandemic. He won MEAC coach of the year in 2018 and has two conference championships and two black college football national titles to his credit. He had the best first-two year start (19 wins) of any head coach in A&T history.

NCCU Breakdown: A break here or a break there and it would have been NCCU representing the MEAC in the Celebration Bowl last season instead of S.C. State. The Eagles are picked to finish second in the league this season, and they have three first-team preseason all-conference players, including QB Davius Richard.

Coach Oliver (NCCU '98): Oliver is in his third season overall and his second season on the field. He led the Eagles to a winning season in 2021 with a 6-5 record overall and a 4-1 mark in the MEAC. Oliver and Washington have a long history together starting when Washington served as Oliver's position coach at NCCU in the mid-to-late 90's. They also served together as assistants on A&T's coaching staff under Rod Broadway from 2011-15.

AGGIES, EAGLES KEEP IT 100 IN CHARLOTTE

- ▶ If you hear it called Aggie-Eagle Classic or Eagle-Aggie Classic that's because old habits die hard.
- ▶ But North Carolina A&T State University and North Carolina Central University will move their heated football rival to Charlotte, N.C., for the Duke's Mayo Classic.
- ▶ It will be the 100th anniversary of the game that has included great players, great games and like most heated rivalries, a few punches thrown.
- ▶ The two fan bases are used to seeing the rivalry moved off each respective campus. Saturday's game will mark the 14th time the two schools have played at a neutral site.
- ▶ Most of those neutral site games came in the 90's when the series moved to Raleigh at N.C. State's Carter Finley Stadium.
- ▶ A&T and Central played 12 consecutive seasons there starting in 1994 with the Aggies winning 10 of those games as a Division I-FCS school, while the Eagles played as a Division II institution.
- ▶ The game drew upwards of 53,000 when the series first started in Raleigh, but attendance began to wane as the Aggies dominated the series the capital city.
- ▶ But the series caught fire again as the Eagles began to make a move toward Division I status and the MEAC after leaving in 1980.
- ▶ After the two teams did not play in 2006, the series returned in 2007 as the Aggies hosted the Eagles in a non-conference tilt at what was called Aggie Stadium. It marked the first time the two schools had played the game on one of the campuses since 1992.
- ▶ The game became a conference game again in 2011 when the Aggies defeated the Eagles 31-21 in East Greensboro. The Aggies were 6-3 against the Eagles in MEAC games over that span. They are 8-6 against NCCU since the Eagles started making the transition to Division I in 2007.
- ▶ The two teams plan to return to Charlotte in 2027 for the Duke Mayo's Classic. The Aggies and the Eagles, now in separate conferences, started a 10-year agreement in 2021 to play each other until 2030.

A&T BY THE NUMBERS

3— It is the number of MEAC opponents the Aggies have on the schedule. The Aggies play N.C. Central on Sept. 3, S.C. State on Sept. 24 and Norfolk State on Nov. 5. There are six football playing school in the MEAC. The Aggies spent 50 years in the MEAC before transitioning to the Big South in 2021.

3 — It is the number of names the Aggies home stadium has had since 2019. The Aggies home facility was called Aggie Stadium for 38 years starting in 1981. The name was changed to BB&T Stadium before the 2019 season and later changed to Truist Stadium the following year.

5 — It is the number of consecutive seasons the Aggies made the postseason before missing the postseason last year with a 5-6 record.

7 — It is the number of NFL Stadiums the Aggies have played in during its nearly 100-year existence if you include the Rose Bowl. They have played in NFL Stadiums in Washington, D.C., Charlotte and Atlanta the most.

7 — It is the number of times the Aggies ranked in the top-10 in total defense nationally in the previous nine seasons. They were top-10 in 2011, 2012, 2013, 2015, 2017, 2018 and 2019.

8 — It is the number of Power Five transfers on the Aggies rosters this season, including Karon Prunty, Elijah Bowick, Mychale Salahuddin, DJ Crossen, Mario Love Jr., Tairiq Stewart, Ger-Cari Caldwell and Robert Porcher IV.

11 — The Aggies have 11 players on their current roster who have undergraduate degrees. Quarterback Jalen Fowler has had his degree for two years, while still playing for the Aggies.

22 — It is the number of times in the past 10 seasons the Aggies have prevented an opponent from scoring a touchdown. The Aggies have shutout opponents 11 times in 10 years.

31 — The Aggies have played in Charlotte 31 times in program history and have a 20-11 record. Their most frequent opponent was former CIAA foe Johnson C. Smith whom they played 18 times in Charlotte. Their last game in Charlotte was in 2017 when they defeated the Charlotte 49ers 35-31.

55 —A&T has played 116 games with Washington being involved with the defense. A&T has held 55 opponents under 80 yards rushing in the last 11 years.

69 — It is the number of times since Sam Washington came to A&T in 2011 that A&T has held a team under 100 yards rushing.

90 — The Aggies have been ranked in the BoxToRow Black College FB poll 90 straight weeks. In 51 of those weeks, the Aggies have been ranked No. 1.

522 — It is the the least amount of yards an Aggies leading rusher has had since Mike Mayhew ran for 471 yards as a freshman in 2009.

COVERING NORTH CAROLINA A&T FOOTBALL

PRESS CONFERENCES/INTERVIEWS: A&T will hold its weekly football press conference each Monday of the regular season beginning at noon. Those press conferences will take place in the student center on campus, mostly in Deese Ballroom. The Sept. 5 and Nov. 7 press conferences will take place in Moore Gymnasium. Head coach Sam Washington will go first followed by players. All press conferences are streamed live on Facebook.

PRACTICES: Practices are open to the media if they are given prior approval by associate athletics director for communications Brian Holloway. Video is permitted during certain moments and use of footage from practice must be limited to drills and plays after the ball has been snapped. No formations are to be shot by videographers or photographers.

WORKING CREDENTIALS: To request game credentials, go to ncataggies.com, go to the left side of the website. Pull down the menu option, scroll down to inside athletics and then scroll down to Football & Basketball Credential Requests and click the link. Fill out the form to request. Credential requests must be made as early as possible. Credentials are limited to media who are there in a working capacity. Media credentials are allotted based on websites whose primary purpose is to gather and disseminate news and who have an affiliation with a nationally recognized media entity/network. They are also allotted to daily newspapers, network affiliate television stations, magazines and weekly newspapers.

PARKING: Gameday media parking will be located at DeHuguley Parking Lot on North Benbow Road. Please arrive to the game in a timely because parking in the lot is limited. The best way to reach the lot is to make a right or left from Market Street because there will be roads closed off on gameday. Parking passes may not be picked up at will call and must be requested during the credential application process.

MEDIA GATE/WILL-CALL: Media will leave DeHuguley Parking Lot and walk down Sullivan Street to enter through the front of the stadium. The media will call table will be located in the General Classroom Building across from the DeHuguley Parking Lot at the end of North Benbow.

PHOTOGRAPHERS/SIDELINE ACCESS: All photographers must wear a photo vest in order to be admitted to the sidelines. This may be received at media will call or the skybox at the stadium. Gameday flip cards will be available at media will call, the multipurpose room inside the Bryan Fitness & Wellness Center or the skybox. Per NCAA rules, images or likeness of current student-athletes may not be sold, distributed or used for commercial purposes without appropriate consent.

SIDELINE ACCESS: Excluding select portions of the game, media sideline access is reserved for photographers/videographers. Credentialed photographers/videographers who arrive at media will call without proper equipment will not be granted a vest for sideline access. When on the sideline, media must remain outside the bench area and may not shoot behind the benches.

VIDEO CONTENT: Press conferences, media opportunities, practices and any form of competition may not be broadcast live, including Facebook Live and related media, without prior consent of the athletics department. Usage of footage from practices is limited. Press conferences, practice footage and other content will be available to the media upon request or the athletics department social sites (Facebook, Twitter, YouTube).

RECRUITS: Per NCAA rules, media are not permitted to have contact with a prospect or family members of a prospect during their official visit, including prospects in attendance at practice or games. In addition, media are forbidden from videoing or photographing prospects during their visit. Media are also asked to make every effort to keep distance from prospects on campus, including at practice, during pre-game activities on the sidelines and in the stands.

RADIO SHOW: The A&T Football coach's show gives fans the opportunity to hear Coach Washington take questions from host Donal Ware concerning A&T Football. The talk show will air live on Facebook every Monday at 12:30 p.m., and on Thursdays on WSJS 96.3 FM and 1400AM.

WASHINGTON MONUMENTS

FIRST TWO SEASONS

No N.C. A&T coach in school history has had a better first two seasons than Sam Washington. In his first two seasons on the sidelines, Washington has won 19 games with two MEAC titles, two Celebration Bowl wins and two HBCU national titles. He has more wins over his first two seasons than any other Aggies coach in school history. Hornsby Howell won 14 games in his first two seasons and Rod Broadway won 12 games in his first two.

Sam Washington is only one of three active coaches with multiple HBCU national titles. Washington has led the Aggies to back-to-back HBCU titles in 2018 and 2019. Two other active coaches with multiple HBCU titles are S.C. State's Buddy Pough (3) and Connell Maynor (3). Maynor is a N.C. A&T graduate who won two HBCU titles at Winston-Salem State and one at Alabama A&M.

10-WIN SEASONS

Sam Washington won 10 games in his first season on his way to winning MEAC coach of the year honors in 2018. Washington is only one of two coaches in A&T history with 10 wins in his first season on the job. George Small won 10 games his rookie season in 2003. In both cases, each man won the MEAC title and led their respective teams to postseason appearances. Small's team lost in the first round of playoffs, and Washington led the Aggies to a Celebration Bowl victory.

BIG SOUTH HONOR ROLL

A&T's BACK IN A FAMILIAR POSITION AS THE FAVORITE

The respect for the North Carolina A&T football program still exists. The Aggies head into the 2022 season as the Big South Conference favorites. In a preseason poll of Big South head coaches, the Aggies received six first-place votes and 60 points total to earn preseason favorite recognition. The Big South announced the poll at the annual Big South Football Media Day presented by BuyB1.com. Coming into a season as the preseason favorite is nothing new for A&T. They have been preseason favorites for six of the last eight seasons. The Aggies were the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) preseason favorite in 2015 and 2016 and 2018-2020. In 2017, the Aggies were picked second in the preseason before going 12-0 overall and 8-0 in the MEAC. In 2021, Big South head coaches predicted the Aggies would finish third, which A&T did.

BIG SOUTH PRESEASON ALL-CONFERENCE AGGIES

The Big South also released its preseason team, which features six Aggies. Linebacker Jacob Roberts, defensive end Jermaine McDaniel, defensive back Karon Prunty, left tackle Ricky Lee III, wide receiver Jamison Warren and placekicker Andrew Brown made the team. In addition, running back Bhayshul Tuten and tight end Nicholas Dobson received honorable mention accolades.

THE DEFENSE

Roberts has emerged as one of the best defensive players in the conference. He is a two-time all-conference performer, earning second-team accolades in the MEAC in 2019 before earning second-team recognition in the Big South in 2021. Roberts led the Aggies in tackles last season with 84. In two seasons, he has 146 tackles, 24 tackles for loss, 9 1/2 sacks, two pass breakups, three interceptions and an amazing four blocked kicks. Injuries slowed down McDaniel last season, but in 2019 he had a terrific season that included 12 tackles for loss and 7 1/2 sacks. Even in limited time a year ago, he had 4 1/2 tackles for loss and four sacks. In 2020, Prunty had one of the best freshman seasons in Kansas Jayhawk history, earning All-Big 12 honorable mention accolades and 247Sports True Freshman All-American honors.

THE OFFENSE

On the offensive side, the Aggies will try to improve on their No. 7 offensive ranking in the Big South. Lee and Warren will play a big part in that. Lee started all 11 games last season and played the second-most snaps on the team among offensive linemen with 648, posting an 80 grade during the season with 475 positive plays and 16 domination blocks. Warren had an outstanding freshman season. He ranked second on the team with 24 receptions. He had 280 yards receiving and a touchdown, including a 103-yard receiving, five-receptions, one-touchdown game at Hampton on Oct. 23, 2021. Brown earned Big South special teams player of the week three times in 2021. He connected on 10 of 16 field goals and 28 of 29 extra points to finish seventh in the league in scoring with 58 points. He was 5 of 6 in field goals from 40 yards or more. Meanwhile, as a freshman, Tuten served as a running back, receiver, punt returner, and kickoff returner. He compiled 786 all-purpose yards on 70 touches, including 230 yards receiving and a touchdown and 215 yards rushing and three touchdowns. Dobson caught four passes last season; three of those receptions went for touchdowns.

IT'S A FAMILY AFFAIR

North Carolina A&T and N.C. Central University have had a 100-year family feud. There are too many connections to count. The Aggies all-time winningest coach Bill Hayes is an NCCU Hall of Fame center. Rod Broadway, who owns the Aggies best winning percentage all-time as a head coach, once coached at NCCU from 2003-06. A&T's current head coach Sam Washington once was an assistant at NCCU. Washington also coached at NCCU for eight seasons in the 90s, where he coached a defensive back and punter named Trei Oliver, who is now the head coach at NCCU. Oliver and assistant Eagles coach Courtney Coard worked as assistant coaches at A&T. Oliver spent five seasons (2011-15) at A&T coaching inside linebackers, and Coard spent 10 seasons in AggieLand as a defensive line coach. He became the co-defensive coordinator in 2018 under Washington. Coard played at NCCU. Tony McRae, one of the best defensive backs in A&T history, is now an assistant at NCCU. There are many families divided by this rivalry. Whether the brother attended NCCU and the sister attended A&T. Whether it is the son who went to A&T and the mother who went to NCCU. There are genuinely many family connections in the rivalry.

CHAMPIONSHIPS GO THROUGH THESE TWO NC HBCUs

The intense rivalry has also included some battles for conference championships. The two schools have spent time in the same conference and some time in separate conferences. They are in different conferences again, but it is usually fun whenever they are in the same league. The two schools have played for the conference championship in the season's final game nine times (1950, 1953, 1958, 1963, 1975, 2014, 2015, 2016). The two teams fought for the MEAC titles for three straight years from 2014-16, with the Eagles winning all three. The teams have shared two conferences, the CIAA and the MEAC. Both teams were integral in starting the MEAC in 1970 before NCCU moved back to the CIAA in 1979. NCCU began to make a move to return to the MEAC in 2006.

RANKING THE BEST HBCU FOOTBALL TEAMS OF ALL-TIME

ESPN+ recently ranked the top-30 HBCU football teams of all time. A&T had one entry in the rankings. ESPN+ ranked the Aggies 2017, 12-0 team as the 18th-best team in HBCU history. The team was led Rod Broadway, with Sam Washington serving as the Aggies defensive coordinator. What made the Aggies undefeated season remarkable was that they did a year after one of the greatest players in school history, Tarik Cohen, left for the NFL. In 2017, the Aggies defeated an FBS team in Charlotte, and they went 8-0 in the MEAC, with an average score of 33-13. To cap off the historic season, A&T defeated Grambling State in the Celebration Bowl, 21-14. The article also speculated that Broadway might be the best HBCU coach of the 21st century. Florida A&M appeared most in the rankings with five different teams recognized, including the No. 1 team of all-time, the 10-0 1961 team led by Jake Gaither.

AGGIES ADD NEW ASSISTANT COACHES

North Carolina A&T head football coach Sam Washington announced the hiring of three new assistants during the offseason. The Aggies needed new coaches after longtime running backs coach Shawn Gibbs took the head coaching job at Fort Valley State and took inside linebacker coach and former Aggie player Denzel Jones with him as his defensive coordinator. Defensive line coach and co-defensive coordinator Courtney Coard took an assistant job at N.C. Central. Washington replaced the trio with Keith Willis (defensive line),

Jason Makrinos (defensive backs) and Lamont Seward (running backs). Washington moved Thomas Howard from DBs to inside linebackers. Willis will also serve as the defensive run game coordinator while Howard will serve as the defensive passing game coordinator. Willis, a former NFL standout, has more than 25 years of coaching experience on both the collegiate and professional levels. He comes to A&T from Division II Edinboro University, where he served as the defensive line/assistant head coach for The Fighting Scots. He also coached on the NFL level for the Tennessee Titans and the Canadian Football League for the Montreal Alouettes. Willis played 139 games during his 11-year NFL career and totaled 59 sacks, 224 tackles and one interception.

Makrinos arrives in AggieLand after one season as the safeties coach with Division I Kent State. In that one season, the Golden Flashes led the Mid-American Conference (MAC) in interceptions and turnovers gained while ranking eighth and 10th in the nation, respectively. That helped the Golden Flashes win the MAC and advance to the MAC championship game for only the second time in school history, which led to only their fifth bowl appearance (Famous Idaho Potato Bowl) in school history. Makrinos spent the previous five years before Kent State as the defensive coordinator and the defensive backs coach for the Findlay Oilers, a Division-II school in the Great Midwest Athletic Conference.

Seward comes to A&T after a season at Tennessee Tech. Seward spent six seasons at Division II West Alabama, where he served as the associate head coach, passing game coordinator and wide receivers coach. There he coached current NFL star Tyreke Hill. He also handled special teams for the Tigers. In 2019, the Tigers led the Gulf South Conference in kickoff returns, kickoff returns defense and they were second in net punting. A season earlier, the Tigers had three of the top seven receivers in the conference. The Tigers went to the playoffs in back-to-back seasons (2017, 2018), and they won the conference in 2017 after leading the Gulf South in kickoff returns and net punting.

THE A&T FOOTBALL GRADUATES

North Carolina A&T has 11 players on their current roster who have already obtained their undergraduate degrees. Quarterback Jalen Fowler and wide receiver Zach Leslie will enter their second season on the Aggies roster with his undergraduate. Fowler is working toward his master's degree in graphic communications. Leslie is an undecided graduate student. The players who graduated in the fall of 2021 include defensive ends Devin Harrell (sports science and fitness management), Robert Porcher IV (liberal studies), and Jermaine McDaniel (agricultural and environmental systems) and center Dacquari Wilson (sports science and fitness management). The spring 2022 graduates include nose guard Karfa Kaba (liberal studies), wide receiver Jordan McDaniel (sports science and fitness management), cornerback Amir McNeill (liberal studies), defensive tackle Shomari Wallace (liberal studies) and offensive lineman Tim Williams (applied engineering technology).

ON THE MOVE AGAIN

North Carolina A&T's athletics department is once again confronting a conference change in the crazy world of college athletics. A&T will have 15 of its 17 varsity sports playing in the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) starting in 2022-23. The only two sports not transferring to the CAA are bowling and football. Bowling will remain in the MEAC because the CAA does not sponsor the sport. Football remains in the Big South Conference for a different reason.

The CAA certainly does have football. It is perhaps the best FCS football conference in America. But if the Aggies had departed the Big South this season, it would have potentially left the conference with five teams. It threatened their automatic qualifier status after schools such as Hampton, Monmouth, Kennesaw State and North Alabama departed the league during the offseason. Monmouth and Hampton joined the CAA. In August, Big South school Campbell announced it will become a CAA school starting in 2023-24. Next season, the Aggies will join the CAA, which has 14 other teams.

TALENTED QBs COMPETE FOR PLAYING TIME

An interesting four-way quarterback battle took place during August camp for the Aggies. Most observers think the quarterback battle in August would be between three players. But it was undoubtedly four. First, of course, there is the incumbent starter Jalen Fowler. Fowler started nine games last season and threw for 1,774 yards, 10 touchdowns and eight interceptions while completing 55.7 percent of his passes. Fowler started the season with solid starts against NCCU, Robert Morris and North Alabama. But Fowler won only one other start after Oct. 9. A&T lost three in a row after Oct. 9 to Kennesaw State, Hampton and Monmouth, in which the Aggies scored 25 points, including a shutout loss to Kennesaw. But Fowler has been in the Aggies offensive system since 2017. He did have good moments last season, including as a runner, and does have an impressive arm. Zach Yeager saw some action in 2021, completing 9 of 15 passes for 57 yards. Then there was newcomer Eli Brickhandler, who the Aggies got to see over the spring. He had a solid Blue-Gold Spring Game, where he the offense on a touchdown drive by completing three big passes. He comes with the tools ready to play as a true freshman. The hidden gem in the quarterback room has a familiar last name to Aggie fans. Alston Hooker competed for time at quarterback, according to Washington. It looks like Yeager may have emerged from the four-way battle with the starting job for the first game of the season.

THE FAMILY THAT QUARTERBACKS TOGETHER STAYS TOGETHER

Alan Hooker broke 18 program passing records as North Carolina A&T's starting quarterback in the mid-80s as he led the Aggies to their first outright MEAC title in 1986. So it appears he has passed on the passing gene. Hooker has two sons who both currently play college football. His son Hendon Hooker served as Virginia Tech's starting quarterback for two years before transferring to the University of Tennessee. He will enter the 2022 season as a second-year starter for the Vols. He has the potential to play on the next level. Meanwhile, Alan's younger son, Alston, is a redshirt freshman QB at his father's alma mater, A&T. A&T football even brought Alan's No. 11 jersey out of honorarium so that Alston could wear it. Head coach Sam Washington said Alston's decision-making is impressive, and he has a good enough arm to win games on the FCS level. He also called him very intelligent with a lot of football knowledge, which probably comes from heredity.

GETTING THE DEFENSE BACK ON TRACK

The Aggies had the 39th-best defense in the nation last season. That is fine for most programs but not for one used to finishing in the top-10 nationally. The Aggies even failed to lead their conference in rushing defense, which has not happened since 2014. The three highest totals the Aggies surrendered to a Division I-FCS opponent last season were the 34 points to North Alabama, the 35 they surrendered to Monmouth and the 35 Gardner-Webb scored in the season finale for a total of 104 points. When you compare that to the 190 points that gave up all season in 2019 and the measly 149 opponents scored against them in 2018, it is easy to see why a defensive coach like Washington can't wait to correct what happened last season. But the Aggies have tremendous experienced talent returning to the defense. Those players have won championships with the Aggies, including defensive ends Devin Harrell and Jermaine McDaniel, nose guard Karfa Kaba, linebackers Jacob Roberts and Joseph Stuckey and defensive back Amir McNeill.

Sam Washington became the 19th head football coach in North Carolina A&T State history on January 9, 2018.

In 2021, Washington entered North Carolina A&T football into a new chapter in its history when the Aggies played their first season in the Big South Conference after the program spent 50 years in the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC).

Washington led A&T football through a tremendous trial as a worldwide pandemic led to the cancellation of the Aggies 2020 season. Before the COVID-19 pandemic, Washington led A&T to the program's 11th overall MEAC championship. In his second season, Washington also won his second black college football national title with a 64-44 win over Alcorn State in the annual Celebration Bowl in Atlanta, Ga.

Washington accumulated more wins in his first two seasons (19) than any other head coach in A&T history. In addition, Washington has already had 11 first-team all-conference selections from 10 different players in four seasons. In 2018, Darry Johnson, Jr. earned MEAC defensive player of the year before being drafted by the Buffalo Bills in the seventh round.

The Aggies have also had two players earn MEAC offensive lineman of the year under Washington, and running back Jah-Maine Martin earned multiple All-American honors in 2019.

In his first season as the Aggies head coach, Washington led A&T to the MEAC championship. Also, in his first season, Washington led the Aggies to their second straight Celebration Bowl victory and the third in four years. The Aggies were also named black college football national champions, finishing 10-2.

For his efforts, Washington became the second A&T rookie coach to capture MEAC coach of the year as he tied the school record for wins by a first-year coach.

Before being promoted to head coach, Washington served as the Aggies defensive coordinator and secondary coach for seven years under legendary head coach Rod Broadway. In 2015, Broadway promoted Washington to associate head coach. He established himself as one of the best defensive minds in Division I-FCS.

As the Aggies defensive coordinator, the Aggies have finished out of the top-20 in total defense only once nationally. In two of those seasons, they were second nationally in total defense. In addition, the run defense has finished outside the top-10 nationally only once, including leading the nation in run defense in 2013.

In three of Washington's seven seasons as the Aggies D-coordinator, the Aggies finished among the top-10 teams in the nation in passing defense efficiency, including No. 1 in 2012.

The Aggies have been the MEAC's No. 1 total defense and scoring defense five times in the past nine seasons played. In addition, they have had the No. 1 total defense in the conference from 2016-19. A&T has also had the No. 1 rush defense in the conference seven times in nine years.

In his role as the secondary coach, seven different cornerbacks earned All-MEAC success in D'Vonte Graham, Justin Ferrell, Tony McRae,

Donald Mattocks, Marquis Boyan, Timadre Abram and Frank “Mac” McCain III, with only Boyan not earning first-team honors. Graham, McRae, Mattocks and McCain have all earned All-American honors from various organizations. In addition, three of Washington’s corners – McRae, McCain and Ayodeji Olatoye – spent multiple seasons on NFL rosters.

Olatoye made the Dallas Cowboys 53-man roster in 2015 and played in the Super Bowl in 2017. McRae has had stints with the Raiders, Bengals, Ravens, Bills and Lions. McCain became an undrafted free agent for the Denver Broncos before signing with the Philadelphia Eagles.

Before arriving at A&T, Washington spent four seasons as Grambling’s defensive backs coach under Broadway. Washington played a significant role in the Tigers’ dominating defense in 2007. Nationally, the Tigers ranked 12th in total defense. Grambling led the nation in turnover margin the following season and was third in scoring defense. Defensive back

Desmond Lenard was ninth in the country in interceptions per game. Three other defensive backs ranked among the Top-50 in interceptions per game that season.

Before Washington came to Grambling, he spent five years at his alma mater Mississippi Valley State. Washington served as an assistant head coach, defensive coordinator, and in his traditional role as defensive backs coach. In his first season at MVSU, he transformed the Delta Devils defense from one of the worst defenses in the SWAC into the league’s No. 2 ranked defense.

Before returning to MVSU, Washington spent one season (2001) as A&T’s special teams coordinator under head coach Bill Hayes. Under Washington, the Aggies had one of the best special teams seasons in school history. The Aggies led the nation in punt return yardage per game, with punt returner Curtis Deloatch breaking the NCAA’s single-season record for punt return touchdowns. Punter Yonnick Matthews was second in the MEAC in punting.

Washington also spent eight seasons at N.C. Central as the school’s assistant head coach and defensive coordinator. Led by All-American Buddy Crutchfield, Adrian Jones and Trei Oliver in 1996, Washington put together one of the best Division II defensive backfields. In addition, the Eagles went 8-3 with the best pass defense in the CIAA. In 1992, he began work at Johnson C. Smith. He was named the assistant head coach. His other duties included being the defensive and special teams coordinator, the defensive backs coach and the head track and field coach.

Washington’s coaching profession also includes a stint with Bethune-Cookman (1987-92), where he helped the Wildcats take a share of the 1988 MEAC championship. In 1998, he secured an internship with the NFL’s Tampa Bay Buccaneers under legendary head coach Tony Dungy.

Washington spent four seasons in the NFL with stops in Pittsburgh and Cincinnati. As a member of the Pittsburgh Steelers, Washington intercepted at least one pass in five consecutive games during the 1984 season. Before making it to the NFL, Washington played cornerback for Mississippi Valley State, where he battled daily in practice with a wide receiver named Jerry Rice.

Washington earned a B.S. degree in physical education from MVSU in 1982. He was inducted into the MVSU Hall of Fame in 2006. He and his wife Donna have one son, Jarvis.
