Alonzo Lee, *Head Coach*



On January 16, 2009, Alonzo Lee, Sr., became the 17th head coach in the history of North Carolina A&T football. Lee brings with him a reputation for putting together the fiercest and stingiest defenses in the Division I Football Championship Subdivision.

Over his career, Lee has proven that defense does indeed win championships. Lee has won seven MEAC Championships at four different schools over his 26-year coaching career. At two of those schools – North Carolina A&T and Hampton – Lee served as the defensive coordinator. In five out of the last 12 seasons, Lee's defenses have led the MEAC in total defense.

Lee is making his second stint with the Aggies. Before returning to N.C. A&T, Lee was the defensive coordinator at Morgan State University for three seasons.

The Bears made significant strides as a defensive unit under his leadership. Over the last two seasons, MSU not only finished No. 1 in the conference in total defense, but the Bears also showcased one of the best defenses in Division I Football Championship Subdivision (formerly known as Division I-AA). In 2008, the Bears led the nation in total defense a year after finishing No. 2 in the country in total defense.

In 2007, the Bears led the nation in pass defense, and followed that performance by finishing No.2 nationally in pass defense in 2008. No team gained more than 350 yards of offense against the Bears in Lee's final two seasons there.

Lee's first stint at North Carolina A&T occurred from 2003-05 as the Aggies defensive coordinator and linebackers coach. In 2003, North Carolina A&T finished as the league's No. 1 defense, and ranked in the top 15 nationally in four categories: total defense (3rd), pass defense (3rd), turnovers gained (6th) and scoring defense (15th). During his last season, the Aggies ranked 3rd in pass defense, 4th in sacks and 4th in not allowing their opponents to convert third downs.

Prior to working at North Carolina A&T, Lee spent six years at Howard as its assistant head coach. In 1987 Lee helped the Bison win the MEAC Championship. Following his time at Howard, Lee spent eight years at Florida A&M where he was responsible for coaching linebackers his first four years. For the remainder of his time he coached defensive backs, handled the strength and conditioning coaching duties and served as the special teams coordinator. During his time with the Rattlers, the school won three MEAC Championships.

Lee became Hampton's defensive coordinator in 1997. In six seasons, Hampton won two MEAC Championships (1997, 1998). The Pirates led the conference in



total defense in 1997. A year later, the Pirates finished second in the conference in total defense, while finishing at the top of the conference in rushing defense.

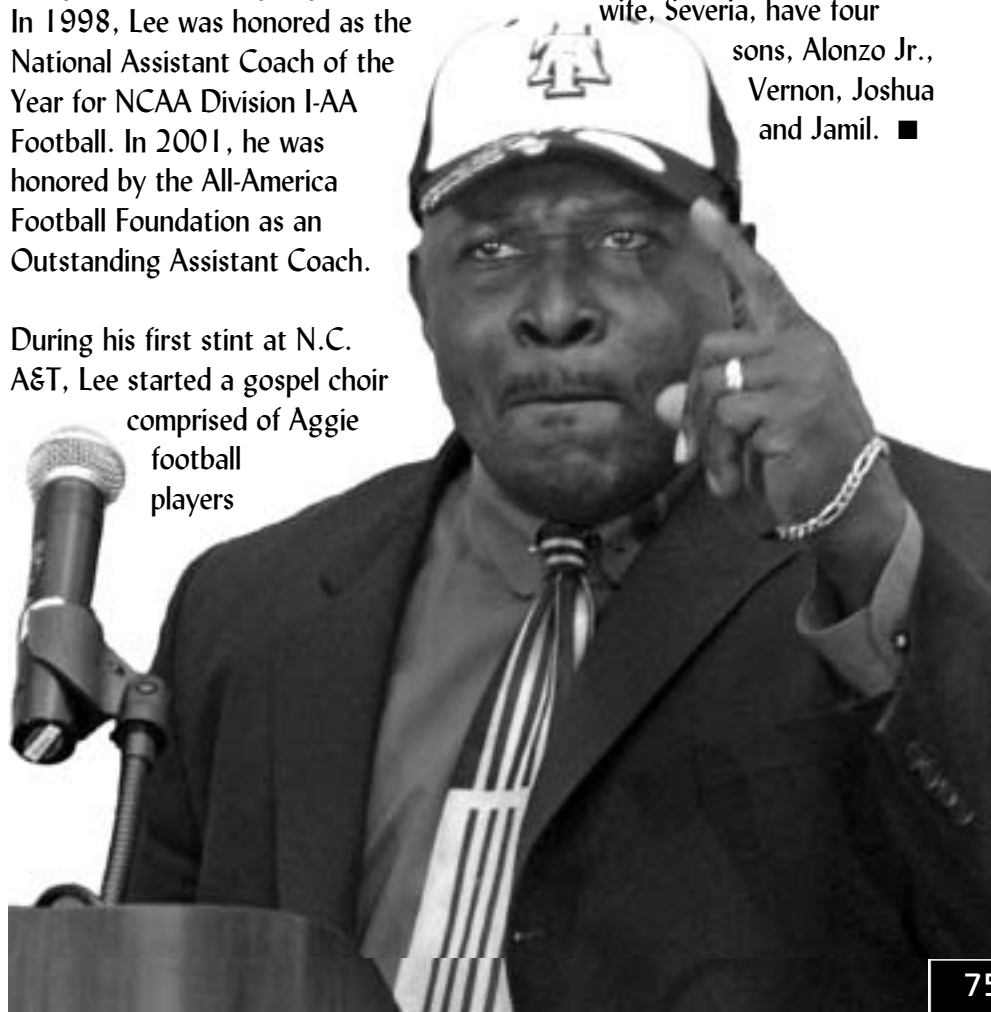
Lee maintains a reputation as an outstanding coach and as a man of exceptional leadership capabilities. In 1998, Lee was honored as the National Assistant Coach of the Year for NCAA Division I-AA Football. In 2001, he was honored by the All-America Football Foundation as an Outstanding Assistant Coach.

During his first stint at N.C. A&T, Lee started a gospel choir comprised of Aggie football players

that performed for church groups and other community organizations in Greensboro. A native of Washington, DC, Lee graduated from Dunbar Senior High School in Washington, DC.

In 1977, Lee joined current Florida A&M head coach Joe Taylor at Eastern Illinois University, where he participated in two NCAA Division II National Championship games, winning one in 1978. He was a three-year captain and led the team in tackles his senior season and was selected as All-American in the same season.

He graduated from Eastern Illinois with a Bachelor's of Science degree in Therapeutic Recreation in 1982. Born January 15, 1958, Lee and his wife, Severia, have four sons, Alonzo Jr., Vernon, Joshua and Jamil. ■



Chennis Berry, *Offensive Coordinator*

Chennis Berry returns to North Carolina A&T for his fourth season overall and his first season under head coach Alonzo Lee.

Berry was hired to serve as the Aggies offensive coordinator and offensive line coach. In addition to coaching the Aggies offensive line, Berry will be responsible for overseeing and constructing the Aggies offensive game plan. His other duties will include being the Aggies primary play-caller on gamedays and recruiting the Piedmont (NC), Fayetteville, N.C., and Metro Atlanta areas. Berry brings with him an excellent reputation of developing solid offensive lines while orchestrating rushing attacks that lead to record-breaking running backs.

Over his career, Berry has also shown a willingness to expand his coaching knowledge. As part of the NFL's Minority Internship Program, Berry has interned with four different NFL teams. In 2009, he participated in the NCAA Expert Coaches Academy Forum. The program prepares young minority assistant coaches for head coaching positions.

Before his return to N.C. A&T, Berry served as Morgan State's offensive coordinator and offensive line coach. During Berry's time there, the Bears possessed one of the most envied running games in the MEAC. In each of his three seasons with Morgan State, the Bears' rushing offense ranked in the top 50 nationally.

Two-thousand seven marked the best year the Bears had under Berry. They led the conference in rushing with running back Chad Simpson compiling 127.5 yards per game to lead the league. Nationally, the Bears' running game was the 18th best in the nation. Simpson ranked ninth nationally, earned MEAC Offensive Player of the Year honors and first-team AFCA All-American

accolades. Simpson and offensive tackle Clifford Louis benefited even more by signing NFL contracts.

Berry's first stint at N.C. A&T lasted for three years (2003-05). Over his first two seasons with the Aggies, he served as the offensive line coach. A strong running game led the Aggies to the 2003 MEAC Championship and a NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision playoff berth. Six games into the 2005 season, Berry took over the Aggies offensive coordinating duties. His first game as the Aggies chief play-caller resulted in an Aggies overtime victory in which running back Brandon Sweeney rushed for 205 yards on 42 carries.

The Aggies continued their strides under Berry. For the first time in school history, three Aggies had more than 100 yards receiving in a game as Brandon Trusty, Doug Brown and Michael Ferguson performed the feat on Nov. 5, 2005. Three weeks later, Trusty tied the school record for receptions in a game with 14. By season's end Trusty tied the school record for receptions in a season with 63. Berry also saw two of his offensive linemen sign NFL contracts. The Green Bay Packers selected Junius Coston in the fifth round of the 2005 NFL Draft. Walter Stith signed a free agent contract with the Buffalo Bills in 2006. Coston played in the 2005 Senior Bowl and Stith played in the 2006 Hula Bowl.

Berry began his career at Morris Brown College in Atlanta where he coached under Aggie great Joe Crosby. After one season with Morris Brown, Berry became the offensive line and tight ends coach as well as the strength and conditioning coordinator at

Kentucky State under another Aggie great – George Small in 1997.

Behind Berry's strong offensive line at Kentucky State, Alvon Brown broke several school and national Division II records. Brown broke the single-season rushing record at KSU twice, and finished his career as the school's all-time leading rusher. He also rushed for 405 yards in a game on September 16, 2000, which at the time was a Division II single-game record. Berry's offensive line also helped Brown win the SIAC Player and Back of the Year awards on two occasions.

In 2001, Berry became the assistant head coach at Fort Valley State. He was responsible for coaching the Wildcats' offensive linemen and tight ends. His impact at FVSU was immediately felt as Philip Shifflet earned SIAC Offensive Lineman of the Year and first-team Sheridan All-Americans honors in 2001.

Running back Orlando Wiley rushed for more than 1,400 yards that season and was named SIAC Player of the Year. The Wildcats' running game led to a Division II playoff berth. The next year another Wildcats running back showcased his talent behind Berry's linemen. Duron Croson was named SIAC Player and Back of the year in 2002. He also led black college football in rushing and was a first-team Sheridan All-American.

Berry earned a B.S., degree in business management from Savannah State in 1996. He also obtained a Master's degree in public administration from Kentucky State in 1999. Berry has one son, Chennis Berry III. ■

Maurice Johnson, *Defensive Coordinator/Linebackers*

First Season

Playing Experience - Two-year letterman at Florida A&M...Named the team's Most Valuable Linebacker in 1997...Spent two years at Copiah Lincoln Community College (1994-95)... Named first-team All-State, first-team All-Region and the Most Valuable Player of his team during his career...Named to the Nation Junior College All-American team as a sophomore.

Education - B.S., in criminal justice (Florida A&M, 1999)

Maurice Johnson enters his first season as North Carolina A&T's defensive coordinator.

Johnson will be responsible for overseeing and constructing the Aggies defensive game plan. His other duties will include being the primary person calling the Aggies defensive alignments on gameday. He will take over a defensive scheme that has proven to be effective over the years. Johnson brings with him his own reputation for coaching top-ranked defenses.

Johnson comes to N.C. A&T after spending one season at Division II Miles College as its defensive coordinator. The other duties Johnson performed included being the team's linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator.

Prior to the 2006 season, Johnson was named the defensive coordinator at independent NAIA school Edward Waters

College. Johnson put together a dominating defense for the Tigers in 2007. The Tigers ranked No. 1 among NAIA independents in total defense, sacks (32) and interceptions (29). Among all NAIA schools, Edward Waters College had the No. 25 ranked defense and rated among the top five nationally in sacks and interceptions.

Johnson began his career in 1998 at Leon High School in Tallahassee, Fla. In 2000, Johnson returned to his alma mater Florida A&M to become a graduate assistant. Two years later he landed his first collegiate coaching job as the defensive line coach, strength and conditioning coach and wellness center coordinator at East Mississippi Community College in Scooba, Miss.

After two seasons at East Mississippi CC, Johnson returned to the high school ranks when he took a position at Jefferson County High School in Monticello, Fla. In one season as the defensive coordinator, the Tigers won their district conference title and advanced to the second round of the playoffs. Johnson made another return visit to Florida A&M in 2005 to serve as the school's linebackers and strength and conditioning coach.

Johnson is a 1999 graduate of Florida A&M, and has a B.S., in criminal justice. He and his wife Verneka are the parents of two sons, LaJavian (16) and Austin (2). The family lives in Greensboro. ■

George Ragsdale, *Assistant Head Coach/Running Backs*

Eleventh Season

Playing Experience - Four-year letterman at N.C. A&T (1972-75)...Compiled 1,989 yards during his career...Left N.C. A&T as its all-time leading rusher...Ranks ninth on the all-time list today...Led the Aggies to the 1975 MEAC Championship, the school's first...Played five years with the Tampa Buccaneers...Played one season with the Washington Redskins, and spent two seasons in the USFL.

Education - B.S., in recreation (North Carolina A&T, 1975)

Personal - Born on Dec. 4, 1952 in Petersburg, Va....Has five children, Turrie, Brad, Marcus, Nicole and Geoyia.

George Ragsdale, one of the best football players to ever wear an Aggies uniform, has also served the Aggie family proudly as assistant coach. The 2009 season will mark his 11th season as an assistant football coach at North Carolina A&T. This will be his first season serving in the role of assistant head coach.

On Oct. 21, 2008, Ragsdale was announced as the Aggies interim head football coach. In his debut four days later, Ragsdale led his alma mater to a 21-20 win over Howard University. The win ended a six-game losing streak. As the Aggies assistant head coach Ragsdale will be instrumental in assisting the head coach Alonzo Lee in coordinating with the athletics staff, team physicians and university faculty to ensure tasks are accomplished in specified areas.

Ragsdale will also return for another season of passing on his vast knowledge to Aggie running backs. Each year under Ragsdale tutelage, Aggies running back Michael Ferguson progressed tremendously. Under Ragsdale's guidance, Ferguson rushed for 2,524 yards and 16 touchdowns on 540 carries to finish sixth on the Aggies all-time rushing list. Ferguson had a career year under Ragsdale in 2007 by almost doubling his yardage total from the previous season with 1,169 yards on 182 carries. Ferguson was the third-leading rusher in the conference.

Ragsdale came back to N.C. A&T after spending two seasons as the running backs coach at Arkansas-Pine Bluff, where he

coached SWAC Freshman of the Year running back Mickie Dean, who led the conference in touchdowns with 17.

Ragsdale has been a staple in the Greensboro community for four decades. Ragsdale's return to the Aggie coaching staff marks his third stint with N.C. A&T. His presence usually proves beneficial for the Aggies. In his previous two stints, the Aggies won MEAC Championships while he was on staff and as a player Ragsdale helped the Aggies win the school's first-ever MEAC Championship.

Ragsdale began his coaching career as an Aggie in 1983 when he accepted an assistant coaching position as a running back coach and recruiting coordinator under then head coach Mo Forte. Under Ragsdale's tutelage, Stoney Polite became one of the best running backs in Aggies history. Polite ended his career as the Aggies all-time leading rusher, and stands at No.4 on the rushing list today.

After leaving N.C. A&T in 1988, Ragsdale spent three seasons as an assistant coach at Dudley High School in Greensboro. During that time frame, he also worked as an intern on the Washington Redskins coaching staff. Ragsdale returned to coaching on the

collegiate level in 1996 when he became the offensive coordinator at Morris Brown College. He remained there for four seasons before taking over the offensive coordinator duties at Norfolk State for three seasons.

Ragsdale worked as a part-time assistant coach at N.C. A&T in 2003, helping the Aggies win their sixth MEAC Championship in 2003. His position players would do well to listen to him, considering his accomplishments while at N.C. A&T from 1972-75, and his numerous years playing on the professional level. Ragsdale was inducted into the N.C. A&T Hall of Fame in 1994 and is the Aggies eighth all-time leading rusher. In March of 2007, Ragsdale was inducted into the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference Hall of Fame.

During his career at N.C. A&T, he rushed for 1,989 yards. On Oct. 10, 1975, Ragsdale rushed for a career-high 232 yards and three touchdowns on 29 carriers against Morgan State. Ragsdale spent eight years playing professional football. He played five years with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, one year with the Redskins and two years with the USFL's Oklahoma Outlaws. ■

Travis Oliver, *Defensive Backs/Recruiting Coordinator*

Sixth Season

Playing Experience - Four-year letterman at Hampton (2000-03)...Earned All-MEAC honors three times...Earned Division I-AA National Defensive Player of the Week honors twice...At the time of his graduation, he was the Pirates' sixth all-time leading tackler.

Travis Oliver enters his sixth season as a North Carolina A&T assistant football coach. This is the first time he will coach under the man who was his defensive coordinator at Hampton during his collegiate career – Alonzo Lee.

This year Oliver will not only take on the role of defensive backs coach, but he will also serve as the Aggies recruiting coordinator. Oliver is the longest tenured coach on the Aggies football staff, having expanded his time over three different coaching staffs with the same review.

He is a hardworking coach with a passion for recruiting and developing talent. Oliver has mainly coached defensive backs since his arrival. He took a brief break from coaching the secondary to coach linebackers in 2006,

but returned to coaching defensive backs later in the season. Over his tenure, the Aggies defensive backs have shown progress. In 2008, freshman Quay Long earned MEAC Rookie of the Week honors.

In three out of the last five seasons, Oliver's secondary has finished in the top five in the conference in pass defense. Two of his secondary players finished in the top 10 in passes defended in the MEAC in 2007. Playing in the secondary is something he excelled at during his playing days at Hampton University.

Oliver, who was a two-year captain at Hampton, showed leadership on and off the field while at Hampton, and continues to display those same leadership skills today. He served three years – two as president – on the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee at Hampton.

As a member of the Student-Athletes Involved in Learning Life Skills, Oliver visited schools in the Hampton Roads area to speak on various subjects that influence today's youth. Oliver's other community ventures include National Youth Sports Program Group Leader. He served as a Homebound Instructor, where he helped instruct students removed from the school environment because of behavioral problems; and he supervised a summer intramural program at Hampton University. ■



Tayrone Odums, *Defensive Line/Special Teams Coordinator*

Second Season

Playing Experience - Four-year letterman at N.C. Central...Earned All-CIAA honors in 1996.

Education - B.S., in physical education (North Carolina Central, 1997)

Personal - Born on July 27, 1974 in Shelby, N.C...Has head coaching experience after being interim head coach at Clark Atlanta.

Tayrone Odums enters his second season as a North Carolina A&T assistant football coach. This season he will serve as the Aggies defensive line coach and special teams coordinator. Last season, Odums was the Aggies defensive coordinator and linebackers coach.

Five Aggies – Tyre Glasper, Nick Clement, Brandon Long, Brandon Jackson and Jarrell Herring – had career years under Odums leadership. Long led the Aggies in tackles with 96 and ranked fourth in the MEAC. Over Odums' 12-year coaching career he has helped to engineer defenses that are ranked high nationally.

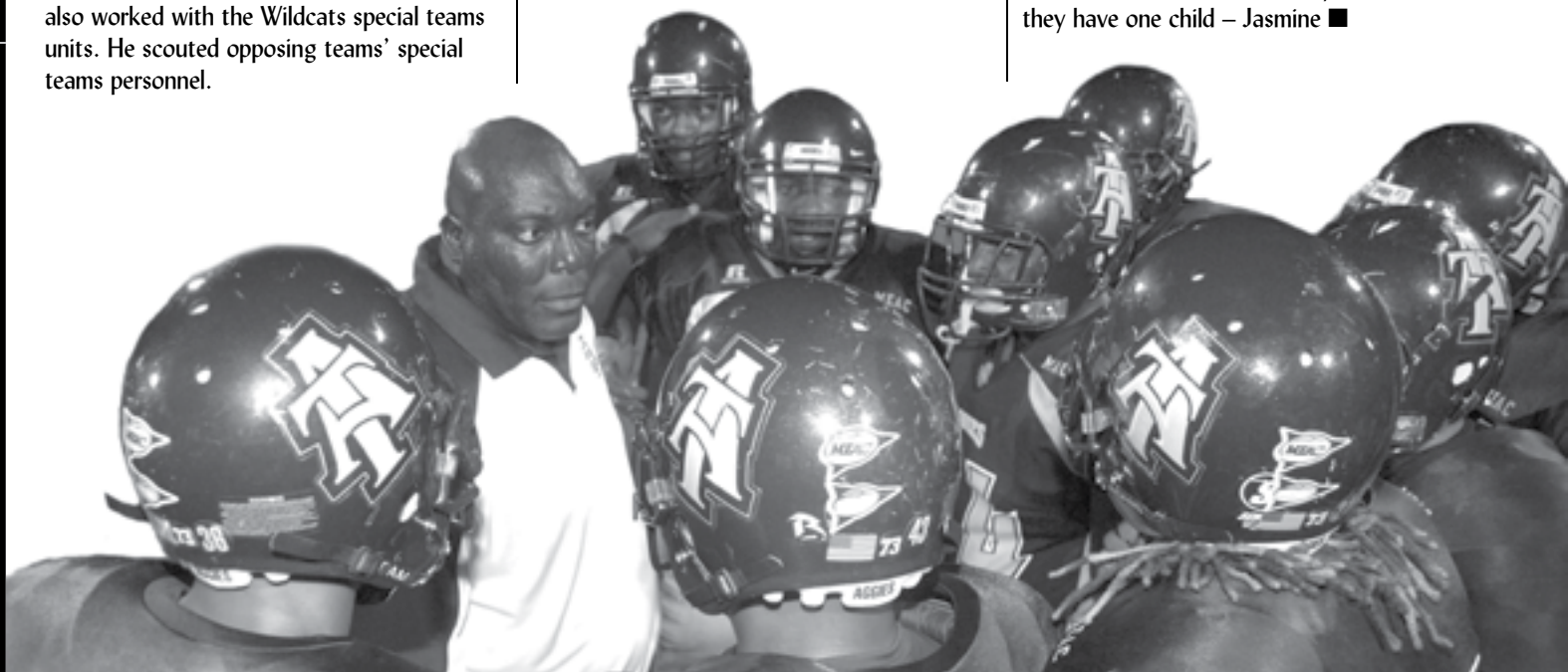
Before coming to N.C. A&T, Odums was an assistant at Bethune-Cookman University. He spent three seasons coaching the Wildcats' defensive line. Over Odums' three-year span there, the Wildcats run defense was among the stingiest. In 2007, the Wildcats defense ranked third in the conference in rush defense and third in total defense. Odums also worked with the Wildcats special teams units. He scouted opposing teams' special teams personnel.

Before arriving at Bethune-Cookman University, Odums spent four seasons at Division II Clark Atlanta. In 2002 and 2003, he served as the Panthers assistant head coach, the defensive coordinator and the recruiting coordinator. In 2004, he earned his first opportunity to head a collegiate program when he took over as Clark Atlanta's interim head football coach. A year later, the interim label was removed from his title as he became the Panthers head coach.

Odums has also been an assistant at Georgia Southern and Gardner-Webb. He spent two seasons at Georgia Southern where he coached linebackers his first year and

defensive ends during his second year. In 2000, Odums played a role in GSU winning a Division I-AA national championship. The Eagles were led by a defense that ranked 23rd nationally in scoring defense and 18th in pass defense. A year later, the Eagles won the Southern Conference with the No. 6 rated defense in the country. Odums was the defensive ends coach at GWU for one season.

Odums received his coaching start Crest High School in Shelby, N.C. He coached linebackers there from 1997-98. Odums earned a Bachelor's of Science degree in physical education from N.C. Central in 1997. He is married to Audrey Odums and they have one child – Jasmine ■



Mike Morand, Co-Offensive Coordinator/Quarterbacks

First Season

Education - B.S., in sociology with a minor in physical education from Florida A&M University and a M.S., in education, with a specialization in sports management from Nova Southeastern University.

Michael Morand enters his first season as an assistant football coach at North Carolina A&T. He was hired as the co-offensive coordinator, quarterbacks and wide receivers coach. Morand, a native of Decatur, GA., is one of the youngest offensive coordinators in the Football Championship Subdivision at the age of 31. Morand will also have the duties of Director of Football Operations. Morand was selected for 2009 NCAA Expert Coaches Forum in Orlando, Fla., in 2009. The Forum teaches upcoming coaches how to become effective Head Coaches. Morand was also selected to do an internship with the NFL Houston Texans in the summer of 2009.

Morand comes to North Carolina A&T after serving as the offensive coordinator, quarterbacks and wide receivers coach at Virginia State the past two seasons. Before his arrival, VSU's offense was ranked eighth in the CIAA. Morand brought the offense to new heights by running the no-huddle Mid-Atlantic Coast Offense. Under his direction in 2007, the Trojans ranked second in scoring offense, total offense, red zone offense, passing efficiency and ranked first in fourth down conversions in the CIAA. In 2008, VSU had the top running back (Taron Hampton, 1076 yards) and wide receiver (Brian Berry, 70 catches, 749 yards) in the CIAA.

In addition, they were ranked No. 10 and 8 respectively in Division II Football. In the course of his two years as offensive coordinator, he produced six All-CIAA players, one third-team Don Hanson All-American and one Offensive Rookie of the Year. Morand also helped the Trojans rank second in the CIAA Eastern conference with a 5-3 record during the 2008 season.

Prior to being hired at Virginia State, Morand served as the running backs coach at Wingate University from 2004-2006. The Bulldogs went 21-11 during Morand's three-year stay. In the course of this tenure, the Bulldogs were ranked in several Top 25 Polls (i.e. AFCA, D2 Football, and Don Hansen).

In 2003, Morand helped start the Barber-Scotia College football program. He was assistant head football coach, offensive coordinator and recruiting coordinator for the Sabers. Throughout the 2002 campaign, Morand was the quarterbacks and wide receivers coach at Livingstone College. In addition, he served as recruiting coordinator and strength and conditioning coach. He coached quarterback Joel Ward, Jr. and wide receiver Chris Jeter to All-CIAA honors.

At Division II West Georgia in 2001, Morand coached Harlon Hill candidate and 1,000 yard rusher Nick Price. He also gained valuable experience coaching the complex West Coast Offense. The Braves compiled an 8-3 overall record in 2001.

During his playing days, Morand was quarterback at Florida A&M University from 1996-99. He was coached by the legendary Billy Joe, the fourth winningest NCAA Division I FCS football head coach with an overall record of 237-108-4 in 31 years.

Morand began as the Rattlers starting quarterback in 1998, running the Gulf Coast Offense and helping lead the Rattlers to the No. 1 scoring offense in Division I-AA with 47.8 points per game. FAMU's offense averaged 521.6 yards per game and 389.9 yards passing per game. FAMU won the

MEAC Championship in 1996 and the Black College National Championship in 1998. The Rattlers participated in the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs each year during Morand's career.

At Southwest Dekalb High School, Morand played quarterback for the winningest Dekalb County Schools coach William "Buck" Godfrey. During his high school playing days, Morand helped Southwest Dekalb win the Georgia state championship and was ranked No. 10 in 1995 by USA Today.

Morand was selected for the 2008 NCAA Coaches Academy in Indianapolis, Indiana. The Academy is developed to train minorities for head coaching positions. Morand was one of 26 people picked from a pool of more than 1,000 applicants. He is also a member of the American Football Coaches Association. Morand is also on the AFCA committee for Professional Development.

Morand earned a B.S., in sociology with a minor in physical education from Florida A&M University and a M.S., in education, with a specialization in sports management from Nova Southeastern University. Morand is married to the former Monica Brady of Lake City, Florida. They reside in Greensboro, N.C. ■

Marshall Glenn, *Wide Receivers/Quarterbacks*

First Season

Playing Experience - Four-year letterman at N.C. A&T...Helped the Aggies win their sixth MEAC Championship in 2003 when he went 5-1 as a starter...Ranks fifth on the Aggies all-time passing list with 3,450 yards.

Education - B.S., in recreational administration (North Carolina A&T, 2007)

Personal - Born on Oct. 29, 1983 in Charlotte, N.C...Volunteered for three years on the N.C. A&T football staff.

Marshall Glenn enters his first season as a full-time assistant coach for North Carolina A&T football.

Glenn will be responsible for coaching the Aggie wide receivers and quarterbacks, while assisting in putting together scouting reports for the Aggies upcoming opponent. Glenn paid his dues to become a full-time assistant for the Aggies. He played four seasons at quarterback for the Aggies before serving three years as a volunteer assistant coach under Lee Fobbs.

Glenn's first years a volunteer assistant was 2006. He helped with the coaching of the N.C. A&T quarterbacks and special teams. During games, he signaled in the offensive

plays to the quarterback. Glenn was also largely responsible for gathering information on Aggie opponents, and putting that information together for scouting reports.

Glenn finished his playing career at N.C. A&T in 2005. In 37 games played, Glenn threw for 3,450 yards and 12 touchdowns. He also completed 283 of his 574 pass attempts. He is fifth all-time on the Aggies passing list. In 2003, he started six games. He went 5-1 in those starts and helped the Aggies win the MEAC Championship.

As a junior and senior in 2004 and '05, Glenn led the Aggies in passing. On Nov. 19, 2005 against S.C. State, he tied the school record for completions in a game with 26. He threw for 342 yards in the same game, which is the third-best passing performance in Aggies history.

Glenn received a B.S., in recreational administration from N.C. A&T in 2007. ■

Dexter Stroman, *Graduate Assistant (Offense)*

Fourth Season

Dexter Stroman began his North Carolina A&T football career in 2003. After playing two seasons and redshirting as an Aggies offensive lineman, Stroman decided he didn't want to wait to start his coaching career. He bypassed his final two years of eligibility to assist former head football coach Lee Fobbs and his staff on a volunteer basis.

Stroman is entering his fourth season on the coaching staff. Among Stroman's responsibilities is assisting Chennis Berry in coaching the Aggies offensive line and tight ends. He will also handle other pertinent duties as assigned. Stroman was a member of the 2003 MEAC championship team. Stroman played his high school career at Marlboro County High School (S.C.) where he helped lead them to the 2001 South Carolina Class 4A State Championship.

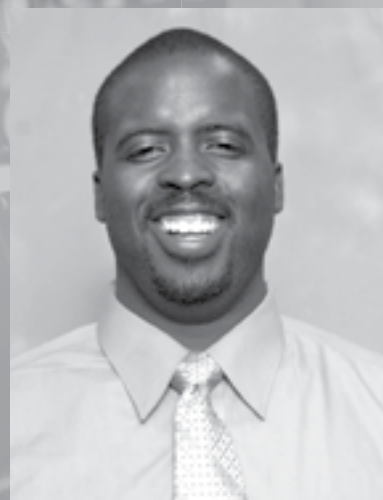
Brandon Reliford, *Graduate Assistant (Defense)*

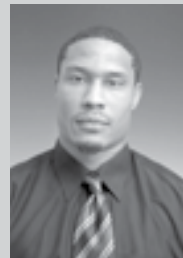

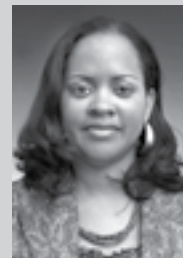
